

GraceWay Launches Initiative to Develop a Family Restorative Housing Facility

In response to the rapidly growing number of homeless families throughout the Treasure Coast, **GraceWay Village has announced its most ambitious initiative:** The construction and operation of a Family Restorative Living Facility (FRLF) on its Fort Pierce campus.

The proposed facility, along with its \$7 million fund-raising campaign, was introduced to area civic and community leaders at a kick-off event at the Port St. Lucie Civic Center on Dec. 10. The first phase, costing \$4.5 million, includes the land purchase and construction of the facility's first wing of 12 family living units.



"Our 'rapid rehousing' FRLF will provide safe, temporary housing for families and their children facing unexpected, serious upheavals to their lives leaving them homeless," explained Cathie Mouring, GraceWay Village's Executive Director. "Families will reside for 30 to 90 days. They will receive professional guidance from GraceWay Village social workers to improve life skills and work habits, as well as job training that will enable them to become self-sustaining. Their stay may be extended, if additional time and services are needed."

The kick-off luncheon was highlighted with the leadership gift of \$250,000 by William and Estelle Turney. They have actively participated in GraceWay Village --- as volunteers helping clients as well as 'gift bag' sponsors of the recent Fashion Show. (See related article.)

Homelessness Impacts our Youngest Residents



The new endeavor expands GraceWay Village's commitment to the 16 percent of St. Lucie County residents who live in poverty, and to the 1,500 students attending St. Lucie County schools who have been registered as being 'homeless.' Of these registered students, some 400 live in substandard, temporary campgrounds or call the family car 'home.' School authorities believe that many homeless families do not register as they are frightened that their children will be removed from their care and turned over to the legal system.

"Their plight is compounded as there is only one homeless shelter that is just open three nights a week. The demand for immediate assistance greatly exceeds St. Lucie County's limited supply," continued Ms. Mouring. "Our goal is for these families to live as self-sufficient, healthy family units."

The event was attended by business and civic leaders including Aileen Pruitt, Senior Vice President at PNC Community Development Banking; PSL City Council Vice President Shannon Martin; St. Lucie County Commissioner Linda Bartz; Michelle Franklin, St. Lucie County Property Appraiser; St. Lucie County School Board Member Debbie Hawley; PSL Assistant Police Chief Richard Del Toro; as well as representatives from Congressman Brian Mast's office, The Crossing Community Church and Westside Church.

Bill and Estelle Turney: Two Lives Dedicated to Humanitarian Service



After a highly-successful career in business and as entrepreneurs, William Turney and his wife, Estelle now focus on benefiting those in need. Their philanthropic commitment again was made highly evident with their recent pledge of \$250,000 towards the creation of GraceWay Village's Family Restorative Living Facility campaign. Bill, who says that he is "absolutely retired," had a career in management of manufacturing

organizations in Ohio and Maryland. Later, he developed an educational service helping high school students improve their writing skills and SAT scores.

Then, both Turneys began to share their good fortune with others.

Bill, a Penn State University graduate had been approached by legendary football coach Joe Paterno. Soon, he was appointed to the Development Committee of its College of Earth and Mineral Sciences. Twenty years later, a student lounge commemorates his service.

Their single-mindedness to help the homeless led them to their active involvement in several nonprofit agencies in Maryland and now, closer to their Port St. Lucie home, on the Treasure Coast. This dedication also led Estelle to GraceWay Village where she volunteers with its meal service and clothing distribution efforts. Meanwhile, Bill participates on the organization's Development Advisory Committee.



"Our passion for helping those in need began 15 years ago when I listened to a priest's sermon about the homeless," Bill explained, then quoting Matthew 25:35, " **'For I was hungry, and you gave Me** *something to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave Me something to drink; I was a stranger, and you invited Me in.*' This concludes in verse 40 with 'The King will answer and say to them, '*Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did it to one of these brothers of Mine, even the least of them, you did it to Me.*' The priest's words hit me between the eyes. Ever since, we have felt an obligation."
